PLAY IT SAFE

YFARS 2-4

Aim

Students will consider aspects of the play area that can be improved to enhance safety.

Description

We spend one-fifth of our day at school in the playground and yard. There are many ways to make the playground a better place for everyone and today you and your students will be the 'advisors'.

Resources

Playground survey (multiple copies or one per group)

Activity steps

- Explain to the class that all playgrounds are different. Some have lots of room to play while others have very little. The most important thing is that there are ways to keep active and feel safe and happy.
- Have students think about their playground.
 - What equipment is there to play on?
 - Are there areas for older children and younger children?
 - Can you eat outside? If so, where?
 - Are there covered and uncovered areas?
 - Are there areas for active games and quiet games?
 - Are there areas to meet new friends?
- Ask students to talk with the person next to them for 2 minutes to try to answer the questions.
- Next, students find the safest areas to play. Have students complete the survey of the playground to see if and how the playground can be made safer and better for everyone. Ask students to work with a partner. Together, they can take the survey sheet and do a 15-minute walk around the playground to help them answer the questions.







Next, students will use the information about the playground to complete the BRAIN activity to see how the playground can be improved.

Divide the class into groups of four, and allocate one part of the playground to each group. (No worksheet is required.)

The BRAIN activity will ask students to think about the playground to:


Beautify it in some way Replace or reorganise some parts of it Add or remove parts of it Increase or decrease parts of it Name it differently.

Imagine your school principal has given you some money to make some improvements to the playground. What would you like to do?

Have students make a list of ideas using the BRAIN concept; ask them to make their recommendations realistic.

- Allow each group a time to share their ideas with the whole class.
- Create a list of the top five improvements the students think can be made to the playground.
- Organise a group of students to present these to the student representative council or the principal for consideration.
